The seminary has five core values.

- **1. Doctrinal Integrity**: Knowing that the Bible is the Word of God, we believe it, teach it, proclaim it, and submit to it. This course addresses Doctrinal Integrity specifically by preparing students to grow in understanding and interpreting of the Bible.
- 2. Spiritual Vitality: We are a worshiping community emphasizing both personal spirituality and gathering together as a Seminary family for the praise and adoration of God and instruction in His Word. Spiritual Vitality is addressed by reminding students that a dynamic relationship with God is vital for effective ministry.
- **3. Mission Focus**: We are not here merely to get an education or to give one. We are here to change the world by fulfilling the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church and its ministries. This course addresses Mission Focus by helping students understand the biblical foundations for fulfilling the Great Commission and the Great Commandments.
- 4. Characteristic Excellence: What we do, we do to the utmost of our abilities and resources as a testimony to the glory of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Characteristic Excellence is addressed by preparing students to excel in their ability to interpret Scripture, which is foundational to effective ministry.
- **5. Servant Leadership**: We follow the model of Jesus and exert leadership and influence through the nurture and encouragement of those around us. Servant Leadership is modeled by classroom deportment.

The core value focus for this academic year is *Doctrinal Integrity*.

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to the philosophical and theological aspects of ministry. The primary thrust of the course is to help students develop a practical approach and skills which will enable them to function as under shepherds in various ministry settings. Lectures are devoted to emphasizing a team orientation to the organization and administration of pastoral nurturing. This course is a prerequisite for all other pastoral care classes.

Student Learning Outcomes

At the conclusion of the semester, the student will:

1. Be acquainted with basic concepts, methodologies, and resources pertaining to contemporary Christian ministry

2. Gain personal insight concerning how one's calling, character, spiritual gifts, and personality traits contribute to Christian ministry.

3. Learn the basic theories, techniques and leadership methods related to organization and administration.

4. Develop a practical approach and skill set for function as an under-shepherd in a range of ministry contexts.

Course Requirements and Grading

Class attendance is essential for effective learning. The student will attend and participate in the class sessions. Because of the extremely limited class time in these Hybrid courses, students cannot miss any of the four class sessions. A grade of "F" will be assigned to students who fail to attend the class. Assignments

- 1. Class Participation: Each student will be expected to participate in class discussion.
- 2. Book Reviews: Each student will read both required textbooks and complete a 3-5 page book review for **each** book.
- 3. Notebook: Each student will compile a notebook containing the information covered in class; class notes, articles, services (wedding, funeral, and ordination), etc.

4. Theology of Ministry Paper: Each student will write a 7 page paper explaining their theology of ministry.
