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Mission Statement

Curriculum Competencies

NOBTS faculty members realize that all ministers need to develop specific competencies if they are going to have an effective ministry. To increase the likelihood of NOBTS graduates having an effective ministry, the faculty developed a competency-based curriculum after identifying seven essential competencies necessary for effective ministry. All graduates are expected to have at least a minimum level of competency in all of the following seven areas:

- *Biblical Exposition*: To interpret and communicate the Bible accurately.

- *Christian Theological Heritage*: To understand and interpret Christian theological heritage and Baptist polity for the church.
- *Disciple Making*: To stimulate church health through mobilizing the church for missions, evangelism, discipleship, and church growth.
- *Interpersonal Skills*: To perform pastoral care effectively, with skills in communication and conflict management.
- *Servant Leadership*: To serve churches effectively through team ministry.
- *Spiritual and Character Formation*: To provide moral leadership by modeling and mentoring Christian character and devotion.
- *Worship Leadership*: To facilitate worship effectively.

The curriculum competencies addressed in this course are: *Biblical Exposition, Disciple Making, and Interpersonal Skills*.

Course Description

This course is designed to introduce students to the field of Christian counseling and basic counseling skills. Biblically-based foundations and approaches to counseling will be examined. In addition, the class will address skill development and application and will examine counseling issues such as marital and family relationship problems, depression, anxiety, anger, forgiveness and reconciliation, substance abuse problems, and spiritual direction.

Student Learning Outcomes

In order to perform counseling effectively with the knowledge and skills necessary, students, by the end of the course, should:

1. Be able to understand the basic foundations and dimensions of biblically-based Christian counseling, including theological, pastoral, historical, scientific, and psychological elements and counseling models.
2. Be able to apply a biblically-based knowledge of pastoral care and counseling to the difficulties commonly faced by church members and their families.
3. Be able to evaluate personal limits in counseling and to know how and when to make appropriate referrals.
4. Be able to communicate effectively using basic counseling skills.

The Embedded Assignment

This course will be assessed for quality and improvement through the use of an embedded assignment. The research paper, required to be completed by all students for all sections of this course, will serve as the basis for this assessment. The rubric for grading the paper is in the course requirements section below.

Course Teaching Methodology

As this course is being taught as an 8-Meeting CIV Hybrid, most of the learning activities will be interactive, with required readings and material posted to the course's Blackboard shell in combination with CIV-assisted classroom meetings. CIV meetings will be used for additional information, focused discussion and in-class activities that enhance the course learning objectives. Each week you will be asked to interact with different types of materials, including lecture notes, PowerPoint presentations, class texts, exercises or practical activities, and responses from other students. Students will participate in a weekly threaded discussion on Blackboard.

Course Requirements

Examinations:

(Midterm—20%, Final—20%)

Exams will cover material from assigned readings and PowerPoint presentations. They will be posted on Blackboard, along with instructions.

Verbatims: (2)

20%

Two verbatims that deal with a problem or issue will be prepared from conversations with people that may be formal (planned) or informal. Care should be taken to protect the identity of the person(s) and informed consent should be given before the conversation is recorded or reported in writing. Verbatims should be submitted through Black Board and include the following:

1. **Introduction:** Introductory paragraph identifying the counselee (fictitious name to insure confidentiality). Include a detailed description identifying: age, sex, marital status, significant family members and contacts, personal appearance (facial, physical, emotional demeanor), and other pertinent information.

2. **Verbatim:** Actual counseling dialogue using the following symbols:
R = counselor; E = Counselee
The verbatims should demonstrate use of the counseling skills covered in class.
3. **Evaluation:** A summary section with conclusions drawn from the session as well as any follow-up plans. The summary must include a personal evaluation of the session (skills demonstrated, your strengths, limitations, and areas of opportunities), along with a spiritual assessment identifying pertinent biblical principles and areas you believe that God is working in the situation.

NOTE: To aid in the reporting of the session, the counselor may use a recording device with the permission of the counselee. Counselors should immediately erase the tape after transcribing the session—assuring the confidentiality (protection) of the counselee.

Book Review: **15%**

Students will write a book review of not less than five pages, excluding cover sheet, of the book *The Counsel of Heaven on Earth* by Ian F. Jones. The review will be double spaced, in accordance with current APA style for counseling majors or Turabian style for all other students. The book review should include (1) a brief summary of content, (2) an evaluation of the strengths and limitations of the work, and (3) its applicability to Christian ministry and counseling. Submit the review on Blackboard at the designated place under Assignments. *Please refer to the Book Review Rubric posted in Blackboard for the specific grading criteria for this assignment.*

Research Paper:

Part One: Draft Research Paper **5%**

Each student will write a first draft of the research paper. The draft must be a complete paper, conforming to all standards as detailed in the “Part Two: Final Research Paper” section (see below) and rubric in this syllabus. **This first draft will be submitted to the NOBTS Writing Center by the due date in the course schedule. Students must also upload a copy of the writing center receipt to Blackboard in the Assignments section.** Information about the Writing Center and the process for submitting papers can be found at <http://www.nobts.edu/writing>. The writing center staff will review the paper and work with the student as necessary to improve it before the final paper is submitted. Working with the writing center should help you in all of your academic writing, as well as help you produce an excellent research paper for this course.

Part Two: Final Research Paper **20%**

Each student will write a paper on a counseling issue (see possible topics below), approximately 20 pages in length (not counting cover sheet, endnotes or bibliography).

The paper should consist of:

1. An introduction to the topic, including definitions, description and extent of the problem, and significant related issues.
2. How the Scripture speaks to the issue and information gathered from research in the field (particularly evidence-based research).
3. An awareness of biblical insights along with possible counseling interventions and resources.

4. Awareness and description of personal counseling skills strengths and limitations, particularly as they relate to the topic addressed.

Possible sources for information include Bible commentaries, books on the subject, counseling texts, journals, and organizations dedicated to addressing the problem—one place to start your search is the syllabus bibliography. Caution: although you may gather information from multiple sources, you need to be careful about the use of material found on the Internet, much of which is of dubious quality. Check your sources carefully. Submit the paper on Blackboard at the designated place under Assignments.

Possible Research Topics: The following topics are generally broad. You may need to narrow the topic in order to cover the material within the requirements of the paper. Students may also choose topics from the chapter headings in the Collins text. The professor must approve other topics.
