Core Value

Each academic year, a core value is emphasized. This course addresses Doctrinal Integrity specifically by preparing students to grow in understanding and interpreting of the Bible." Course Description

In this course, students will enhance their English vocabulary, improve their literal and analytical comprehension of English writing, develop strategies to read and write successfully in English, and practice using these skills through regular reading and writing exercises.

All of these will be developed in relation to academic reading and writing tasks. Emphasis will be placed on individual students' needs.

Course Teaching Methodology

The course will involve the following methodologies of lecture, class discussion, readings, and individual learning assignments.

Course Requirements and Grading

1. Each student will read the textbooks in preparation for each class period (see schedule below). A quiz will be given each class period based on the required reading for that day. Missed quizzes cannot be made up. This assignment relates to GEC #1 and CSLO #1.

2. Each student will take a midterm exam and a final exam. Sickness, funerals, and pregnancy are the only excuses for missing exams. In case of sickness, a doctor's note will be required. This assignment relates to GEC #1; BACM PSLO #2; and CSLOs #1, #2 and #3.

3. Each student will analyze the historical setting of one of six (6) passages—Branches of Government, The Rule of Law, The Constitution, The Declaration of Independence, The Industrial Revolution and Citizens' Rights and Responsibilities. A list will be provided that the students will use. Students will be required to use the provided sources, but additional research of 3-5 sources is also expected. The paper should be written according to standard guidelines (Turabian 8th edition; Times New Roman 12 pt. font; double-spaced; 1-inch margins, footnotes, etc.). This assignment relates to GECs #1 and #3; BACM PSLO #2; and CSLOS #2, #3 and #4.

Evaluation Criteria

The grading scale as outlined in the Leavell College Catalg will be utilized: A = 93-100; B = 85-92; C = 77-84; D = 70-76; F = 69 and below

Additional Course Information

1. <u>Attendance Policy:</u> Per the Leavell College catalog, school policies regarding absences and tardies will be strictly enforced. Any student missing more than nine hours will automatically receive a grade of "F" for the course.
