NOBTS PhD students again were recognized as outstanding researchers by the Southern Baptist Research Fellowship at their September 2015 meeting.

For his dissertation, "An Analysis of Selected Church Health and Church Context Characteristics among Growing, Plateaued, and Declining Churches in the Arkansas Baptist State Convention," David Bond was named runner-up Researcher of the Year. Drs. Randy Stone, Donna Peavey, and Jake Roudkovski constituted David's dissertation committee.

Ai Kyung Ra received third place for her dissertation, "An Investigation of the Relationship between Children's Ministry Volunteer Satisfaction and the Leadership Styles of Pastors Serving in Korean Southern Baptist Churches in the United States," guided by Drs. Donna Peavey, Allen Jackson, and Bill Day.

Research Proposals Due by November 2

Students registering for the January 4-8, 2016 Prospectus Development course must submit 4 copies of the research proposal to the guidance committee chair by Nov. 2. Chairs will enlist two additional division faculty to read the proposal and give feedback, and the committee has until Dec. 18 to work with students on revisions and forward 2 copies of the approved proposal and a report form to the ReDOC office.

Registration for Spring Scheduled for Nov. 2-16

Online registration for January and spring 2015 is scheduled to open on Monday, November 2 at 8:00 a.m. CST and close at 4:00 p.m. CST on Monday, November 16. Students beginning the PhD program in January will receive paper registration forms with their acceptance letters.

Students who are not taking a course do not need to register online. If you are on program proficiency, dissertation writing, or ReDOC-approved inactive status, the ReDOC office will work with the Registrar's office to register you under your advisor or guidance committee chair.

Keep in mind that PhD is a continuous enrollment program, so students who have not completed seminars and colloquia <u>must</u> register for a class or be placed on program proficiency status, which is assessed the tuition cap.

If you are submitting a research proposal to your guidance committee chair by the November 2 deadline, you should register for the January 4-8 RDOC9303 Prospectus Development course. If your committee does not approve your proposal by the December 18 deadline, you will be dropped from the course at no charge.

Students who register online should be able to see their spring registration immediately on their SelfServe unofficial transcripts. Students registered by the ReDOC office should be able to verify their registrations via SelfServe the week after registration closes.

If you have a STOP on your account, work <u>now</u> with the office that placed it so you will be cleared to register.

Newcombe Fellowship: Nov. 15 Deadline

The <u>Charlotte W. Newcombe Doctoral Dissertation Fellowships</u> support the final year of dissertation research for PhD candidates in the humanities and social sciences. Eligible proposals have religious or ethical values as a central concern and are relevant to the solution of contemporary religious, cultural, or human rights questions. The stipend is \$25,000 for a twelve-month period of dissertation writing.

Proposal submission deadline: **November 15, 2015**

NEW: An IRB request <u>and</u> a pdf of a prospectus using human subjects must be received by redocsec@nobts.edu no later than <u>one month prior</u> to the meeting at which the prospectus will be considered. See the <u>Program Materials</u> page for the form and details.

A prospectus to be considered by ReDOC must be reviewed by your guidance committee and **9 copies** submitted through your chairperson to the Office of Research Doctoral Programs no later than one week before the scheduled ReDOC meeting. Proposals for research involving human subjects must be received one month before the meeting.

Likewise, matters such as directed study proposals and requests to take courses at other institutions must be submitted one week before the ReDOC meeting at which they will be considered.

Also e-mail a **pdf** of the prospectus or directed study proposal to phd@nobts.edu. Do

submit a hard copy of the directed study approval page.

Please keep in mind that final approval of your prospectus is granted by your doctoral guidance committee after you make any revisions your committee deems appropriate in light of feedback from ReDOC.

If you are required to go through the Institutional Review Board approval process for research with human subjects, your committee cannot approve your prospectus until the IRB assesses the risk to and protection of the participants.

NOTE: If you think your guidance committee has approved your prospectus but you have not seen your approval in the *ReDOC News*, please let us know.



Submissions will be reviewed by the Editorial Advisory Board within 30 days of the deadline. Notification will be made to all who submit proposals by May 1; completed articles will be due by November 1, 2016.

Can You Dig It? The Gezer Water System Expedition 2016

May 22-June 10, 2016 \$650* per week + Airfare

*Extra days: \$100/day

Sponsored by The Moskau Institute of Archaeology/Center for Archaeological Research of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and the Israel Nature and Parks Authority

The Project: Participate in the excavation of an ancient Canaanite water system at Tel Gezer in Israel.

Dates: May 22-June 10, 2016. Volunteers should plan to arrive no later than May 21, and those working all three weeks should plan departures for June 11 or 12.

Cost: \$1,905 for the 3-week season, or \$650 per week (extra days: \$100/day) + airfare. Costs cover room, board, and weekend travel. Preference will be given to three-week participants. Participants are responsible for their own flights to and from Israel. The dig will arrange airport pickup.

Weekend Travel: The expedition will arrange several field trips covering key areas of Israel. Weekend travel costs are included in the excavation pricing.

Accommodations: Volunteers will be housed in airconditioned rooms at the Neve Shalom Guest House, with three to four persons per room.

Academic Credit: Undergraduate or graduate course credit for up to 6 semester hours is available. Additional tuition fees apply.
