Abstract text begins here. Note that the names associated with the project are single-spaced while the text that follows is double-spaced. In Turabian 8, academic degrees are abbreviated without periods or spaces. Provide a succinct, descriptive account of your work indicating your purpose, project model, and results. For proposals, use present tense, and for reports, use past tense.

The line spacing at the top of this page is best accomplished in single space.

While Turabian 6 required a two-inch margin at the top of the abstract page, Turabian 8 does not. Paragraph symbols are shown here for spacing demonstration purposes. Go to *Home/Paragraph* to turn the paragraph symbols on and off. Note the two lines of space between Abstract and the title, between the title and the names associated with the project, and between the names associated with the project and the text. Switch to double space for the abstract text.

The abstract is the last page in the front matter, immediately preceding the main body of text. While Turabian 6 did not require a page number on the abstract, Turabian 8 does. Limit the abstract to one page.

Format Abstract and the project title in bold, 14 point. Replicate the same title form used on the title page.

Choose *Align Text Left* rather than *Justify* in the *Home/Paragraph* spacing choices. Maintain this text alignment throughout the document.
