Course Description

In this seminar, students will explore the foundations of women's leadership from a biblical, philosophical, theological, and historical perspective. Using the Biblical examples as a guide, women's leadership in the church today will be researched and discussed, including challenges, callings, opportunities, and cultural perspectives.

- 1. Explore biblical foundations of women's leadership.
- 2. Examine theological, historical and cultural perspectives of women in ministry leadership.
- 3. Research unique challenges for women in ministry leadership today.

Course Requirements

1. Contemporary Issues Textbook Discussion & Application (15%) Students will select one textbook from the "Additional Textbook" section above and email professor before August 10 to request choice and avoid duplication. Before the seminar, this textbook needs to be read in full. A two-page, single-spaced critique needs to be written. In this critique, students will include bibliographical information, a summary of the book, strengths and weaknesses, and why this topic is applicable to women in ministry leadership. The critique should be submitted via Canvas by Monday, September 8, 2025. Also, copies will need to be brought to the class seminar for each class member. Students should come to class prepared to lead a discussion on their book with other classmates.

2. Biblical & Historical Woman Biographies (15%)

Students will select one Biblical leader and one historical female leader by August 10. They will then prepare a 10-minute presentation on each of their two assigned women leaders. A one-page, single spaced biographical summary for each woman leader will follow include biographical information, leadership principles exhibited and further recommended resources. A print-out of each summary will be brought for classmates on the first day of the Seminar and will be submitted via Canvas (Monday, September 8, 2025).

3. Let This Mind Be in You Book Discussion & Critique (10%)

Students will read their assigned chapter in the textbook, *Let This Mind Be in You*, prior to seminar and will come to class prepared to lead a discussion on that one chapter. Students should be prepared with talking points/questions for their chapter in the book. After the seminar, when the entire textbook has been read, a one-page, single-spaced critique of *Let This Mind Be in You*, will be submitted via Canvas, due no later than Friday, September 26, 2025.

4. Women Leading Well Book Discussion & Critique (10%)

Students will read their assigned chapter in the textbook, *Women Leading Well*, prior to seminar and will come to class prepared to lead a discussion on their assigned chapter. Students should be prepared with talking points/questions for their chapter in the book. After the seminar, when the entire textbook has been read, a one-page, single-spaced critique of *Women Leading Well*, will be submitted via Canvas, due no later than Friday, October 10, 2025.

5. Worthy Book Discussion & Critique (10%)

Students will read their assigned chapter in the textbook, *Worthy*, prior to the seminar and will come to class prepared to lead a discussion on that one chapter. Students should be prepared with talking points/questions for their chapter in the book. After the seminar, when the entire textbook has been read, a one-page, single-spaced critique of *Worthy* will be submitted via Canvas, due no later than Friday, October 24, 2025.

6. Leadership Principles Reflection Paper (20%)

Students will write a critical reflection paper (8-10 pages) on at least 3

leadership principles pertinent to women in leadership derived from the course readings as well as personal research and ministry experience. In addition, at least 3 biblical or historical women will be referenced in the paper as examples to follow. Papers should be submitted via Canvas no later than Friday, November 7, 2025.

7. Women in Ministry Leadership Research Paper (20%)

Students will write a research paper concerning a theological, historical, or cultural issue pertinent to women in ministry leadership. (Your topic can be expounded upon from your chosen Contemporary Issues Textbook and Application, or you can choose a different topic for women in ministry leadership.) The paper should be 10-12 pages with a minimum of 8 sources in the bibliography. Papers should be summitted via Canvas no later than Monday, December 1, 2025.

Attendance Policy

Intensive Seminar Classes: Students are expected to attend and participate in the class sessions. Because of the nature of the intensive, students who miss any portion of the class may receive a grade of "F" for the course.
