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Mission Statement

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Leavell College prepare servants to walk with Christ, proclaim His truth, and fulfill His mission.

Course Description

This course will incorporate a significant conference designed for students interested in missions or church planting. The seminar will be conducted with the North American Mission Board Send Orientation/Conferences. Students will attend conference sessions designed to encourage and inspire participants in missional leadership and church planting. In addition to attending the conference sessions, students will complete other designated course requirements. Included in the required readings for the course will be various subjects related to the practice of church planting in North America.

This class will be part of the Send Network Orientation in Alpharetta, GA, November 17-19. All fees of the conference, travel, and lodging are covered.

Student Learning Outcomes

In order to help fulfill the Great Commission, the students, by the end of the course, should:

- 1. Identify and discuss the missional and church planting content from the conference presentations, breakouts, and the other readings and assignments.
- 2. Understand the church planting vision, strategy, and opportunities with the North American Mission Board and Send Network.
- 3. Synthesize the principles gleaned from the conference and other seminar assignments into current ministry contexts.
- 4. Develop an action plan for taking the next steps in partnering as a supporting or sending church in church planting through; prayer, participation, and provision in a North American context.
- 5. Develop an action plan to transition one step forward in the Send Network Church Pathway by taking the next steps in discovering, developing, and deploying church planters and church planting teams from within a local church context.

Course Teaching Methodology

The course will involve the following methodologies:

Small group interaction and discussions, as well as on-site class sessions with the professor and other seminar participants. STUDENTS MUST ATTEND ALL MAIN SESSIONS OF THE SEND ORIENTATION/CONF RETREAT AND AVAILABLE BREAKOUTS. A canvas shell for the class will be utilized extensively as a student resource. Students will be expected to complete all pre and post-seminar course assignments.

Course Requirements

1. Participation and Attendance. Each student is to attend all of the sessions and available breakouts of the Send Orientation/Conference and be prepared to discuss and provide feedback at the conclusion of the conference.

2. Pre-Class and Conference Work.

- **Reading:** Read any 3 of the listed textbooks
 - a. Write a 5-7-page, double-spaced review for 2 of the 3 books. These two book reviews should cover a summary of the ideas/thesis of the book, one key quote from five chapters (listing should consist of a quote, one to four lines max, and the page number), personal and ministry application, and summary of strengths and weaknesses. **Due November 17th.**

3. Post-Class Work.

- Gathering/Conference Assignment: Compile 30 quotes from the Conference. Students must have quotes *from every main session* but can also use breakout sessions. Compile a double-spaced reflection paper with the speaker, session/breakout title, quotes, and a 2-paragraph personal summary and review of the session/breakout. Due November 21st.
- 30 minutes virtual meeting with Bo Smith, <u>bsmith@namb.net</u> to take the next steps in church mobilization, residency, and planting. **Due November 21**st. Schedule a meeting via email.
- Application and Synthesis paper: Write a 8-10-page double-spaced Application and Synthesis Paper explaining each of the 5 Send Network values as headings (Seek first the kingdom, Deepen devotion, Stick together, Think multiplication, and Engage your city) and detailing how pursuing these values might impact your personal walk with the Lord and how they might impact your church as a whole. This assignment is meant to help you reflect on everything you learned at the gathering and in the course readings and apply them to your personal walk with the Lord and your local church. Due December 1st.
