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#### **Mission Statement**

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Leavell College prepare servants to walk with Christ, proclaim His truth, and fulfill His mission.

## **Course Description**

This course is designed to expose students to current leadership issues in ministry to women by attending the Abide Women's Conference. Presentations from outstanding leaders in women's missions and ministry will provide information that can be applied in the local church. In addition, students will have the opportunity to network with women's ministry leaders and learn about available resources for ministry to women.

#### **Student Learning Outcomes**

At the conclusion of the course, the student will:

- 1. Understand current trends in leadership relating to women's ministry.
- 2. Identify leadership principles in women's ministry.
- 3. Recognize leadership personnel and resources in women's ministry.
- 4. Apply relevant leadership skills in her own ministry context.

## **Course Teaching Methodology**

Lectures and Power Point presentations will be provided by the conference's main speakers and breakout session instructors as well as small group discussion and networking opportunities.

## **Course Requirements**

- 1. **Enroll**. Students will enroll in the course with NOBTS as well as register for the conference including the pre-conference. Students are responsible for own transportation, housing, and meals.
- 2. **Read the Required Textbooks**. Students will read the required textbooks and submit a statement of completion.
- 3. **Attend Sessions**. Students will attend all sessions of the Abide Women's Conference including pre-conference, main sessions, and breakouts.
- 4. **Meet for Debriefing Sessions**. Students will meet with Dr. Dean during the conference for debriefing. In addition, students will meet with Dr. Dean and Dr. Dew for two follow-up sessions online on the following dates/times:
  - Wednesday, Feb. 5 from 12-1 CST (Abide conference takeaways/debrief)
  - Wednesday, April 23 from 12-1 CST (synthesis of all that you learned from textbook/research)
- **5. Summarize Conference Notes**. Students will take thorough notes during all sessions and submit a copy of conference notes. The notes can be a scanned pdf of written notes or a typed copy of the notes. **Due Wednesday, February 5, 2025.**
- 6. **Write a Critical Evaluation/Application Paper**. Students will write an evaluation paper. The evaluation should be 8-10 pages (excluding cover and bibliography) and should include the section headings listed below:
  - Identifying Information about the Conference (1/2 pg)
  - Purpose of the Conference (1/2 pg)
  - Summary of the Sessions (not as in depth as the above assignment 1pg)
  - Evaluation of Speakers/Content (include highlights and constructive criticism 3-4 pgs)
  - Personal Application of the Conference (3-4pgs)

Due Wednesday, March 5, 2025.

7. **Write a Synthesis Paper.** Using the textbooks and 2-3 additional sources, the student will write an 8-10 page, double-spaced paper about biblical community. In this paper, the student will synthesize their research and address why biblical community is needed, the foundations of it in Scripture, how to create and foster it, as well as how to protect and multiply it. **Due Wednesday, April 23, 2025.** 

#### **Evaluation of Grade**

This course will follow the grading system for the Graduate School:

A = 93 - 100 15% =Conference Attendance B = 85-92 15% =Textbook Reading

C = 77-84 15% = Conference Notes Summary

D = 70-76 30% = Evaluation Paper F = Below 70 25% = Synthesis Paper

Students are expected to attend and participate in all conference sessions including the pre-conference. Because of the nature of the intensive, students who miss any portion of the conference may receive a grade of "F" for the course.
