

PMCP8304 Developing a Strategy for Church Multiplication New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary Church Ministry Division June 24-26, 2024

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Mission Statement

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Leavell College prepare servants to walk with Christ, proclaim His truth, and fulfill His mission.

Course Description

This course aims to help the student develop a strategy for church multiplication, with a particular focus on preparing and facilitating church planting from a local church context. Students will develop a vision and plan for leading churches to multiply. They will identify the next steps for discovering, developing, and deploying church planters and missionaries from a local church context. Students will learn key missiological components necessary to facilitating church planting multiplication and movements.

Course Teaching Methodology

The course will involve the following methodologies:

A variety of teaching methods will be utilized, such as class presentations by the professor using PowerPoint and handouts. Other teaching methods include small and large group discussions, group projects, multi-media presentations, utilization of mission-related websites, and other communication mediums. A Canvas shell for the class will be utilized extensively as a resource for students. Students will be expected to be thoroughly prepared for the seminar discussions.

Student Learning Outcomes

To help fulfill the Great Commission, the students, by the end of the course, should:

- 1. Define and describe a multiplying church.
- 2. Identify universal characteristics of church planting movements.
- 3. Examine the sending theme and language in the Old and New Testaments.
- 4. Formulate a missiology of church multiplication for his or her ministry context.
- 5. Develop a vision and plan for leading churches to multiply.
- 6. Implement a missional hermeneutic in leadership.
- 7. Develop a strategy for discovering, developing, and deploying missional leaders in a local church context.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Participation and Attendance. Because this course will include lectures, small group discussions, team activities, and presentations, students are expected to participate actively in each class. Punctual attendance and full participation are expected. Unexcused absences will affect the student's grade. The seminary's attendance policy is followed for this class.
- 2. Reading reports.
 - **Pre-class Reading**. Students are expected to read all the books <u>**BEFORE**</u> class. To participate in meaningful class discussion, students must have read all the material before class.
- 3. Teaching/Preaching Assignment: Students must use "Theology of Mission" and create an 8-week teaching/preaching series. Students should be able to implement this assignment in a local church context. Utilizing a "Missional Hermeneutic" presented in the book lesson should focus on the sending theme in Scripture. Lessons must be from the Old and New Testaments. Each lesson must have: 1. Lesson Title, 2. Biblical Supporting Text, 3. Lesson Summary, 4. Lesson Outcome, 5. Lesson Outline, 6. Lesson Application. This assignment should be between 10-15 pages. Students will present assignments in class. Due on the first day of class, June 24, 2022.
- **4. Post-class Reading**. Students are to prepare a 2–3-page critical review of "*Gaining by Losing*" in the following format: 1. Book Summary, 2. Strengths, 3. Weaknesses, 4. Conclusion/Implementation. This assignment is due on July 24, 2024.
- **5. Post-Class Residency Assignment.** Using "How to Start a Residency" by Clifton, students are expected to present a 5–8-page plan of action to implement a ministry residency at their local church, in which they outline how they will discover, develop, and deploy leaders from within their congregation. Additional information will be given in class. This assignment is due on July 24, 2024.

Students should follow the seminary's manual of style and form for all written assignments. Letter grades will be in accordance with the NOBTS course catalog. contributions to the field, and preparedness for classroom discussions. The professor reserves the right to employ a bell curve on grade distribution.

LATE WORK:

All assignments are due **in class** on the assigned dates. Late work will be penalized one quality point per day it is late (this includes weekends). Assignments turned in after class, yet on the same day that they are due, will still be considered late work.
