Course Requirements and Grading

- 1. Each student is required to read the assigned material prior to coming to class. This includes both readings from the textbook and from the Gospels. *This assignment relates to BACM PSLO #1 and #3, and CSLO #3*.
- 2. Throughout the semester, various daily assignments will be made in order to prepare for discussion or to put into practice the information. *This assignment relates to GECs #1 and 3, BACM PSLO #1 and #3, and CSLO #3*.

- 3. The student will be assigned four essays throughout the semester. Each essay will be graded on content and presentation. The topics will be assigned a week before they are due. *This assignment relates to GECs #1 and 3, BACM PSLO #1 and #3, and CSLO #3*.
 - Essay #1: The Bottom Line: Truths on Freedom from Galatians
 - Essay #2: Dealing with the Difficult Church: Lessons from the Corinthian Correspondence
 - Essay #3: The Significance of and Teachings from Philemon
 - Essay #4: The Value of Life Investment in others (Pastoral Epistles)
- 4. The student will complete a book summary for each letter of Paul studied. The summation should follow the outline given in class and must be submitted through Blackboard in order to receive credit. *This assignment relates to GECs #1 and 3, BACM PSLO #1 and #3, and CSLO #3*.
- 5. The student will complete a mid-term and a final exam.
