

# LCBS4333-30 New Testament Interpretation: Romans Spring 2020, Term 203 Monday, 8:00 pm – 9:50 pm

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## **Mission Statement**

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Leavell College prepare servants to walk with Christ, proclaim His truth, and fulfill His mission.

## **Core Value**

### **Course Description**

The purpose of the NT interpretation courses is to acquaint the student with pertinent background information for the books being studied. After an examination of the introductory materials, an exegesis of selected passages serves as the core of the course. Special attention is given to the development of themes within the books.

### **General Education Competencies (GECs)**

Leavell College has identified four General Education Competencies:

- 1. Critical Thinking
- 2. Oral Communication
- 3. Written Communication
- 4. Quantitative Reasoning

This course addresses GEC #1 and #3.

This course addresses BACM PSLO #1 and #3.

### **Course Student Learning Outcomes (CSLOs)**

At the conclusion of the semester, the student will be able to

- a. Comprehend the introductory issues of the New Testament.
- b. Value the New Testament as the revelation of God.
- c. Read the New Testament more critically with appropriate understandings of introductory matters and central themes

### **Course Texts**

- a. Mounce, Robert H. *Romans*. The New American Commentary. Nashville: Broadman Press. 1995
- b. Four (4) English versions of the Bible: New American Standard, English Standard Version, New King James Version, and New International Version.

## **Course Requirements**

- Attendance and Participation Students are expected to attend and participate in class. This assignment relates to GECs #1, #2, BAM PSLOs #1, and CSLO #1.
- 2. Assigned Reading

Reading is an integral part of the course objectives, providing important background material to the lectures. Students are required to read through Romans at least 4 times, each in a different version, see above. Students are required to read the textbook commentary. *This assignment relates to BACM PSLOs #1, #3, and CSLOs #1, and #2*.

3. Exegetical Paper: The student will write an exegetical paper on a passage of Romans.

The exegetical paper should be 6-8 pages consisting of

- a short introduction setting the passage in context
- an exegesis section
- a section stating the biblical/theological principle
- a conclusion applying the passage to Christian living in the modern setting
- a selected bibliography containing at least eight sources consisting of at least 5 commentaries, journal articles, and at least one scholarly electronic resource.

Additional guidelines: Only company-published sources should be used, not

self-published resources. Assignment formatting should be according to the latest edition of Turabian, including typed in 12-point Times New Roman font, written in third person, using correct spelling and grammar, proper cover page, stapled together without a folder. The final paper will be due on May 4<sup>th</sup>. *This assignment relates to GECs #1, #3, BACM PSLOs #1, #3, and CSLOs #1, 2, 3, 4*.

- 4. Memorize the designated passages of Paul's letter to the Romans on the "Course Schedule" below. Any of the above referenced versions may be used, but the same version must be used for all passages.
- 5. Exams

Students will complete a Mid Term and a comprehensive Final exam. The Mid Term and Final Exam will consist of questions from the materials discussed in class as well as pertinent material from the required readings. The exams will consist of multiple choice, true/false, matching, listing, short answer, and essay questions. The Mid Term is due on March 23<sup>rd</sup> and the Final Exam is due on May 11<sup>th</sup>. *This assignment relates to GEC #1, #3, BACM PSLOs #1, #3, and CSLOs #1, #2, #3, and #4*.

# 1. Attendance Policy

- c. Created in a 12 pt. Times New Roman font
- d. Include a Turabian-formatted Title Page
- e. Submitted as Word documents (Documents submitted in any other form will not be graded.)
- f. Submitted to the course's Blackboard shell
