The mission of Leavell College of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary is to equip leaders to fulfill the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church and its ministries.

Core Value

The seminary has five core values.

- 1. **Doctrinal Integrity**: Knowing that the Bible is the Word of God, we believe it, teach it, proclaim it, and submit to it. This course addresses Doctrinal Integrity specifically by preparing students to grow in understanding and interpreting of the Bible.
- 2. Spiritual Vitality: We are a worshiping community emphasizing both personal spirituality and gathering together as a Seminary family for the praise and adoration of God and instruction in His Word. Spiritual Vitality is addressed by reminding students that a dynamic relationship with God is vital for effective ministry.
- **3. Mission Focus**: We are not here merely to get an education or to give one. We are here to change the world by fulfilling the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church and its ministries. This course addresses Mission Focus by helping students understand the biblical foundations for fulfilling the Great Commission and the Great Commandments.
- **4.** Characteristic Excellence: What we do, we do to the utmost of our abilities and resources as a testimony to the glory of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Characteristic Excellence is addressed by preparing students to excel in their ability to interpret Scripture, which is foundational to effective ministry.

5. Servant Leadership: We follow the model of Jesus and exert leadership and influence through the nurture and encouragement of those around us. Servant Leadership is modeled by classroom deportment.

The core value focus for this academic year is Spiritual Vitality.

Course Description

The purpose of this course is to enhance the competency of the Christian/Theological Heritage. This course is designed to provide an overview of the history, structure, and activities of the Southern Baptist Convention. Included in the course will be a look at the current state of the convention, as well as the future prospects of the Southern Baptist Convention.

General Education Competencies (GECs)

Leavell College has identified four General Education Competencies:

This course addresses GEC #3.

Leavell College has identified three program Student Learning Outcomes:

- 2. Service and Leadership (both BACM PSLO #2 and BAM PSLO #2)
- 3. Historical and Theological Interpretation (both BACM PSLO #3 and BAM PSLO #3) This course addresses BAM/BACM PSLOs #2 and #3.

Student Outcomes

In order to understand and interpret Christian theological heritage and Baptist polity for the church, the students, by the end of the course, should:

- 1. Comprehend Baptist beliefs and Baptist identity
- 2. Value a Southern Baptist Life and Ministry
- 3. Be able to apply the characteristics of Southern Baptist Life to local church ministry.

Course Requirements and Grading

- 1. <u>Class participation</u> Attendance in class is a necessary part of instruction in this course. Students are allowed a maximum of nine hours of absences during the semester. Three tardies count as one absence. The student will receive an automatic "F" when the tenth hour has been missed; this is in accordance with Seminary policy. Student participation in class discussions is an important part of the class experience. Class attendance and participation are considered when the student's grade is close between two possible final grades. Absences or tardies over five will receive a modest penalty. *This assignment relates to CSLO #1*.
- 2. <u>Unit examinations</u> (100 points each) -- Three unit examinations will be given through the course of the semester. These tests will cover both materials covered in class and in the readings. These tests will consist of objective sections (matching, true/false, fill-in-the-blank, and multiple answer questions) and subjective sections (identification, essay, and opinion questions). Each exam will only cover material from that particular section, including the final exam. All students are expected to take the exams at the scheduled times. In emergencies, the exams must be scheduled by the student within one week of the missed exam. Any exam not made up within two weeks of the original exam date will be given the grade of zero. *This assignment relates to PSLO #3 and CSLO #1*.
- 3. <u>Class readings</u> (50 points) -- Each student is expected to read all of the assigned materials on the assigned dates. These readings are intended to augment and support the class discussions, and thus need to be read according to the timeline listed in the course schedule, before the class meeting on that topic. Each student will provide a signed statement that they have read the assigned material in a timely fashion at the end of each unit, reporting the percentage of the assigned readings they have read in that unit. Also, you will write a brief summary of five points you have learned from the assigned readings in each unit. *This assignment relates to PSLO #3 and CSLO #1*.
- 4. <u>Reflection paper</u> (50 points) -- Each student will write a 5-8 page personal reflection paper on the subject "Why I am (or am not) a Southern Baptist." The paper will address the distinctives of Southern Baptist belief and practice. See the grading rubric to see guidelines for your paper. *This assignment relates to GEC #1, PSLOs #2 and #3 and CSLOs #1, #2, and #3.*
