Josh Peeler Wins Emerging Scholars Grant!



Josh Peeler (biblical exposition) has been named recipient of the 2018 Scott M. Gibson Emerging Scholars Grant spon-

sored by the Evangelical Homiletics Society. He will receive the \$2,000 cash award and present his paper at the EHS annual meeting October 11-13 on the NOBTS campus.

A jury of EHS members chooses the grant recipient through a blind process in which students' identities and schools are unknown to the readers. Dr. Dennis Phelps, Professor of Preaching, emphasized that bestowal of this honor is not related to NOBTS hosting the annual meeting this year: "The work of these students as Associate Members of EHS stands on its own. Nevertheless, I am grateful for the recognition that is coming to our academic program and the work of our students, especially during a year when we are serving as host."

In 2015, Josh won the top honor at the first Young Scholars Competition held by the Land Center for Cultural Engagement at SWBTS for his paper "The Pastoral Theology of Thomas Chalmers as a Model of Christian Cultural Engagement." This distinction included a \$1,000 grant.

In addition to the MDiv in expository preaching and the ThM in pastoral ministries from NOBTS, Josh holds the MA in Interdisciplinary Studies with a specialization in cross-cultural communication from the University of Oklahoma.

Newcombe Fellowship: November 15 Deadline

The Charlotte W. Newcombe Doctoral Dissertation Fellowships support the final year of dissertation research for PhD candidates in the humanities and social sciences. Proposals should have religious or ethical values as a central concern and be relevant to the solution of contemporary religious, cultural, or human rights questions. The stipend is \$25,000 for a 12-month period of dissertation writing, with the expectation the dissertation will be completed between April 1 and August 31, 2019.

Research Proposals Due by November 1

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Students planning to take the January 7-11, 2019 Prospectus Development course must submit 4 copies of the research proposal to the guidance committee chair by November 1, 2018. The chair and second member will enlist two additional division faculty to read the proposal and provide feedback. Committees have until Friday, December 14 to work with students on revisions and forward 2 copies of the approved proposal and a Research Proposal Report form to the ReDOC office.

Students whose proposals are not approved by the deadline will be dropped from the course at no charge.

An IRB request <u>and</u> a pdf of a prospectus for research using human subjects must be **submitted to the guidance committee chair**, who must

forward them to redocsec@ nobts.edu, indicating permission to proceed, no later than one month prior to the meeting at which the prospectus will be considered. See the Program Materials page for the form and details.

A prospectus to be considered by ReDOC must be reviewed by your guidance committee and 11 copies (double-sided printed is allowed) submitted through your chairperson to the Office of Research Doctoral Programs no later than one week before the scheduled ReDOC meeting. Prospectuses for research involving human subjects must be received one month before the meeting.

Likewise, matters such as directed study proposals and requests to take courses at other institutions must be submitted one week before the ReDOC meeting at which

Also e-mail a **pdf** of the prospectus or directed study proposal to phd@nobts.edu. Do submit a hard copy of the directed study approval page.

If your research involves human subjects, you must go through the Institutional Review Board approval process. Your guidance committee cannot approve your prospectus until (1) the IRB assesses the risk to and protection of the participants; (2) you submit your revised prospectus, consent form, and IRB request; and (3) the IRB approves your treatment of human subjects as reflected in these documents. You cannot contact study participants before approval of both the IRB and your guidance committee. IRB approval is valid for two years.

The maximum length for the prospectus is 30 pages of text plus the selected bibliography.

2018-2019 Wabash Center Teaching Seminars for Doctoral Students

Over the next few years, Wabash Center Teaching Seminars for Doctoral Students will be held in U.S. cities with significant numbers of doctoral programs in theological and religious studies.
